

Great Dog Walking Parks in Tualatin Hills Park & Recreation District



THPRD's 200+ park sites offer an abundance of opportunities for you to walk your dog, and we encourage you to take advantage of them regularly. Pets are not allowed within the Tualatin Hills Nature Park or Cooper Mountain Nature Park. All dogs are required to be on a leash and under control by their owners while visiting Park District property. Owners are responsible for the removal of all solid waste deposited by their dogs. Please use your doggy bags and protect the environment. Violation of rules may warrant a civil fine of \$100 and possible exclusion from the park.

1. Rock Creek Trail at Bethany Lake

Park at 185th at Bethany Lake Park just south of West Union Avenue. Head east on the paved trail that skirts Bethany Lake and head to Rock Creek Soccer fields (1.32 miles). Currently, if you want a longer walk, walk to West Union and head east until you reach the neighborhood access point off 179th. Rock Creek Trail will soon have a connection through Allenbach Park that will connect the entire trail to Kaiser Woods Park.

2. Willow Creek Nature Park (15 acres)

Park at the Waterhouse Soccer field on NW Silverado & Mission Oaks Drive. Two trailheads are located across the soccer field. Very nice boardwalk through wetlands and Moshovsky Woods.

3. Jenkins Estate (68 acres)

8005 SW Grabhorn Road South of 209th and Farmington. Park at Camp Rivendale.

You can walk the gardens at this revitalized country estate with your pooch or hike the many wooded trails. Parking at Camp Rivendale is available from dawn until dusk.

4. Lowami Hart Woods Park (29 acres)

Entrances along Hart Rd between 152nd and Forest. Official trails can be confused with social or deer trails, so be sure to note where you came from so you don't get lost. This is a nice forested hike along Johnson Creek with several loops to choose from.

5. Hyland Forest Park (29 acres)

Northeast of SW Murray and SW Sexton Mountain Drive. Access off SW Hargis Road/SW 139th and

Sexton Mountain Drive. Several more access points are available along the park's border. This is a popular people and dog walking park with lots of loop trails throughout the forest.

6. Fanno Creek Trail/Denney Road

The Fanno Creek Park/Denney Road trailhead is located in the northernmost portion of Fanno Creek Park, just west of Highway 217, on the south side of Denney Road. The path winds through forests, wetlands and parks. Wildlife abounds along the trail and along Fanno Creek and continues south of Hall Blvd. through Greenway Park, then into Tigard. When completed, this trail will be 10 miles long.

7. Hazeldale Off-Leash Dog Park

Access off 196th and Farmington.

Operated and maintained by THPRD, Hazeldale is Beaverton's only dog park. The park offers a two-acre off-leash area with separate fenced area for small and large dogs. The park is roomy with lots of small trees scattered throughout the area. There are waste bag dispensers on site, and water is usually available.

8. Garden Home to Fanno Creek

To walk the entire Fanno Creek Trail start at the Garden Home Recreation Center. The trail begins on the north corner of the parking lot, along Oleson Rd. At 92nd Ave., cross the road and continue straight along the sidewalk of Allen Blvd. At the next intersection, cross the road and take a left down Scholls Ferry Rd. and then turn right at Denny Rd. After passing over Highway 217 use the crosswalk to reach Fanno Creek Park to your left.

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
